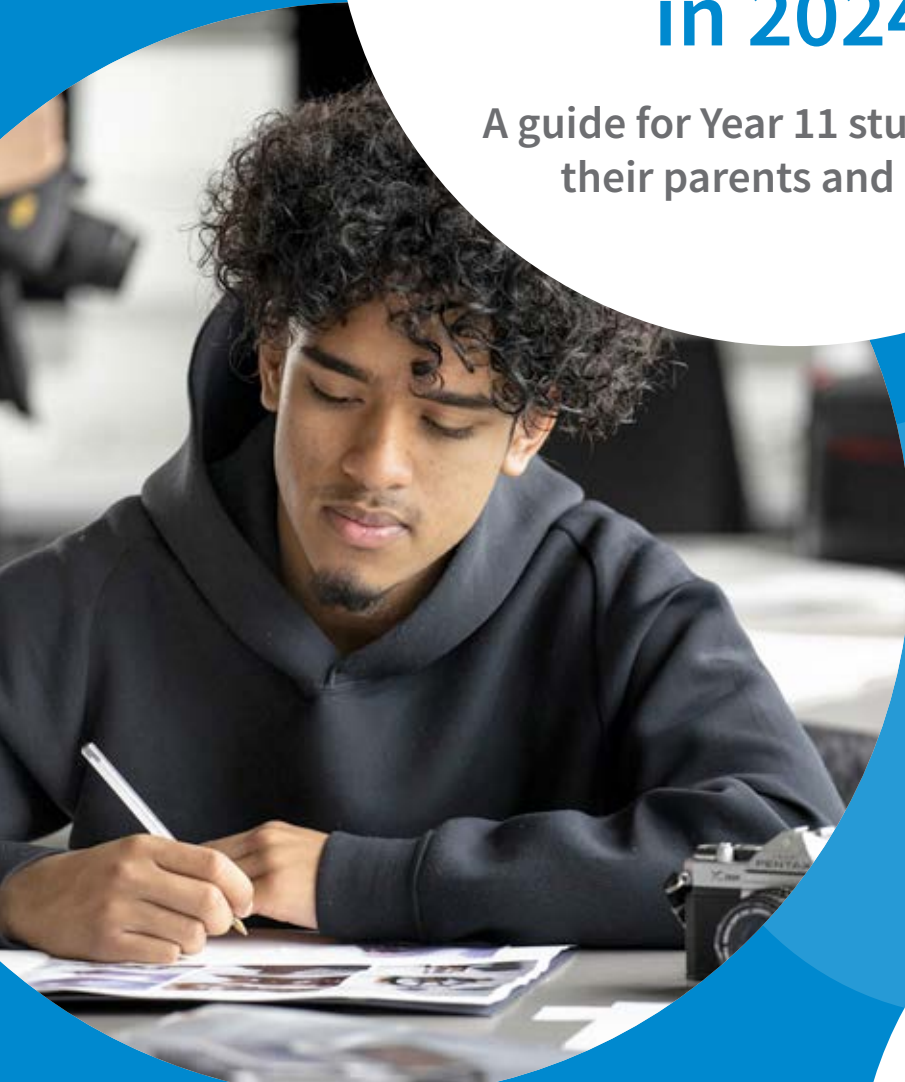




Progressing to Post-16 in Tower Hamlets in 2024

How to use this booklet

This is such an exciting and important time. The choices you make in the coming weeks and months will be key to helping you make the most of the great opportunities on offer in Tower Hamlets. This booklet is packed with information to help you make the best possible choices about the next steps in your education or training.

Your teachers and careers advisers will be able to give you lots of advice so do talk to those who work with you in school so that you choose the pathway that suits you best.

You can also get support from the Careers [Young WorkPath](#) Team who can provide further careers information, advice and guidance about education and employment.

The basics

All young people in England are expected to continue in education or training until at least their 18th birthday. This could mean:

- continuing in full-time education in a school sixth form, college or with a training provider
- starting a work-based training programme such as an apprenticeship, traineeship or, if you have an education, health and care plan, a supported internship
- starting full-time work or volunteering (20 hours or more) combined with part-time education or training which leads to relevant qualifications.

Getting started

- Think about the type of course that will suit you best. Academic courses are based on traditional classroom learning. Vocational qualifications are often career-based and include more practical learning.
- Do as much research as you can into the courses that interest you. Find out about the entry requirements, the course content, and how the course is taught and assessed.
- If you are pretty clear about your future career goals, make sure your chosen courses will enable you to achieve the career you want.
- If you're unsure about your future career, check out where the courses you're considering can lead to in terms of further education, training or employment. [The National Careers Service](#) website is a good place to start.
- If you're thinking of going to university, visit [UCAS.com](#) to find out more about the courses available and their entry requirements. For some courses, for example medicine, you might need to take particular A-levels such as biology and chemistry.
- Look at the prospectuses of different schools and colleges you're considering. Do they feel like the right fit for you? Check if they will provide the level of support you need. Look at what else they offer in terms of enrichment and personal development.
- Find out when their open days or evenings are by visiting their websites.
- Check out the application deadlines of each provider and get your application in on time.



The most popular qualifications explained

A-levels

Short for Advanced Level, A-levels are academic qualifications that are examined at the end of a two year course. There are more than 40 different A-level subjects on offer in England – some will be subjects that you studied at GCSE and others may be new. Most providers require you to have achieved a minimum of five good GCSE passes, including in English and mathematics. There are often additional entry requirements for particular courses.

BTECs

BTECs are practically-based, vocational qualifications and the most common type of general vocational qualification. The subjects available are related to broad job areas, including business, performing arts, engineering, and health and social care. Some may also include work experience.

BTECs are offered at levels 1 to 3. Most universities and colleges in the UK accept Level 3 BTEC qualifications. In 2017 for example, over 25% of students starting university held at least one BTEC.

BTECs are assessed through a combination of regular coursework, projects and some externally marked tests.

T-levels

T-levels are an alternative to A-levels, apprenticeships and other 16 to 19 courses. Equivalent in size to 3 A-levels, a T-level focuses on vocational skills and can help students into skilled employment, higher study or apprenticeships. Each T-level includes an in-depth industry placement that lasts at least 45 days. Students gain valuable experience in the workplace; employers get early sight of the new talent in their industry.

T-levels are available in a wide range of work-related industries, including design and construction, digital production, education and early years, healthcare, finance and accounting, engineering, legal services, hairdressing, barbering and beauty therapy, media broadcast and production and animal care and management.

T-level Transition Programme

The T-level Transition Programme is designed for students who wish to take a T-level but are not quite ready. It's a one-year post-GCSE course which helps students develop a broad range of knowledge, skills and behaviours to help them progress to and succeed on their chosen T-level.

Cambridge Nationals

Cambridge Nationals are practical courses designed to develop students' real-world skills to prepare them for their future. Qualifications are offered at levels 1 and 2 and are assessed through a combination of internal and external assessment.

Cambridge Technicals

Cambridge Technicals are vocational qualifications at Level 2 and Level 3 and are similar to BTECs. They're designed with the workplace in mind and are assessed through a combination of internal and external assessments.

Entry level qualifications

Entry level qualifications are designed for students who are not quite ready for GCSEs or who haven't studied for a long time. They are available in traditional subjects such as English, maths and science. Qualifications are also available in subjects such as life skills, literacy and numeracy, English for speakers of other languages (ESOL) and functional skills. Vocational qualifications are also available, for example in hairdressing and office practice. Students can progress from entry levels 1 to 3. Each unit is assessed separately so students' achievements are recognised as they progress.

NVQs

NVQs are National Vocational Qualifications. Each NVQ includes practical work-related tasks. NVQs are available in a wide range of work-based subjects ranging from plumbing to hairdressing. They are a good choice for students who know what they want to do because they provide training for a specific job. NVQs are available at levels 1, 2, 3 and above. They usually take one year to complete and are assessed through portfolio assessment and observation.

Which courses are right for me?

The courses you will be able to study in Year 12 depend on the qualifications you already have, or are expecting to achieve by the end of Year 11.

Use the following guide (on the next page) to work out which pathway is right for you. It's important to check each school or college's entry requirements. For some subjects, such as A-level maths and A-levels in sciences, there will often be additional entry requirements. Make sure you check this before applying for a place.

Equal opportunities for students who have an Education and Health Care Plan (EHCP)

If you have an Education and Health Care Plan (EHCP), you can choose to attend any of the mainstream sixth forms or colleges listed within this booklet. You will need

to complete an application form and will also need to meet the entry criteria for your chosen course. You should discuss your post-16 education choices with your SENCO who will work with your caseworker to ensure the sixth form or college is consulted and if you meet the entry criteria, named in your plan.

All mainstream providers listed in this booklet will provide extra support to make sure you are included in the same way as other students. However, there are also specific courses that are tailored to meet the needs of young people who do not wish to or are not able to attend a mainstream college or sixth form. Preparation for university

All schools and colleges in Tower Hamlets have strong links with Higher Education Providers, including the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge and other Russell Group and Top Third Universities. Sixth form leaders and tutors are knowledgeable and skilled at helping you find the right course and in the right university for you.

Your tutors will support you throughout the application process, from identifying the course and university that matches your career goals to completing your application form and personal statement and, where applicable, to preparing for interviews.

You can find out more about each provider's links with higher education institutions by speaking to staff on your open day visits.

And you can find out more about applying to university – and the huge range of courses on offer – by visiting the [UCAS](#) website. This website also includes a helpful section on [student finance](#) which explains how tuition fees and student loans work. Your teachers will of course help you understand how all this works during your post-16 study programmes.

The Elephant Group

Students on the programme will benefit from links with The Elephant Group's partner organisations, including the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge.

Increasing access to Oxford for British Bangladeshi and British Pakistani students

This year, we will again be working closely with the access team from Jesus College, Oxford, to increase the representation of British Bangladeshi and British Pakistani students at top universities. The programme runs from the Summer term in Year 12 right through to January in Year 13 and includes a variety of information sessions, panel discussions, application support sessions, Q&As, and academic lectures.

The programme is offered to students in Tower Hamlets schools and aims to give them the tools they need to make informed and empowered applications to Oxford and other high-tariff universities.

Speak to your sixth form tutors about how to become involved in the programme.



Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships give young people the opportunity to work for a real employer, gain a nationally recognised qualification and earn a salary all at the same time. Study fees are funded through the Apprenticeship Levy. So, not only do apprentices earn a salary, they do not have to take on any student debt.

Apprenticeships are available from Level 2 (GCSE) to Level 7 (Master's Degree) in over 1500 job roles covering more than 170 industries, from advertising to youth work, sports, engineering, law, nursing or nuclear decommissioning. A wide range of employers offer apprenticeships including, for example, Amazon, Google, Greggs, Superdrug, the BBC and Tower Hamlets Council. Last year, around 80,000 under 19 year-olds and over 100,000 19 to 24 year olds started an apprenticeship.

Training and qualifications

Employers work closely with training providers to ensure that training equips apprentices with the skills they need for the job. Apprentices typically spend 80% of their time in the workplace with the remaining 20% spent in the classroom or shadowing colleagues.

When can I start an apprenticeship?

You can start an apprenticeship on the first day after the last Friday in June (official school leaving date in England) as long as you are 16 or become 16 before 1 September of that year. This means you can apply while you are still at school. You need to be living in England and not in full-time education.

How much will I earn?

The minimum wage for apprentices aged 16 to 18 is updated yearly. Many employers are now trying to pay the National Minimum Wage or London Living Wage to all apprentices regardless of age.

The government is looking to increase the number of apprenticeships that are available in the UK over the next few years and we are committed to increasing the number of apprenticeships available across the borough

Apprenticeships

How do I find and apply for an apprenticeship?

You can use the online vacancy site provided by the [National Apprenticeship Service](#). You can create an account to help you manage applications and get alerts about new apprenticeships.

You can also find out which apprenticeships are available in your local area by using the [find an apprenticeship](#) website. The [UCAS website](#) also includes information about available apprenticeships. You can also visit www.notgoingtouni.co.uk and www.ratemyapprenticeship.co.uk for further information.

Your local employment support services, Workpath (any age) and Careers Young Workpath (ages 16-19 and up to 25 years if the young person has an EHCP), can also give advice and guidance, and can help you to find a suitable apprenticeship placement. The council also works with partners to deliver a range of apprenticeship schemes, including for young people with SEND needs and care-experienced young people. Which apprenticeship is right for me?

You can apply for different types of apprenticeship based on your current skills and qualifications.

It's not all about grades. Employers are also looking for young people who demonstrate passion for their industry, a willingness to learn and other attributes such as communication skills and their ability to work with others.



Entry requirements

Level 2 (Intermediate), equivalent to GCSEs:

The only actual requirement is that applicants are aged 16 or over. Employers will be keen to ensure though that you have the ability to complete the apprenticeship successfully. Your training provider will help you secure your Level 2 English and maths if you don't already have them.

Level 3 (Advanced), considered equivalent to

A-levels: At this level, employers will typically be looking for five GCSEs, particularly A-C/4-9 grades in English and maths. Relevant experience will also be useful.

Levels 4/5 (Higher) considered equivalent to a

foundation degree: Employers will look for at least five GCSEs at grades A*-C/4-9 including English and Maths. Level 3 qualifications may also be required, such as

A-levels, BTECs, T-levels or equivalent qualifications. It's at this point where experience in a relevant subject may also be required.

Levels 6/7 (Degree), considered equivalent to a

bachelor's degree: Employers will look for at least five GCSEs at grades A*-C/4-9 including English and Maths. As well as three or more A-levels, including in at least one relevant subject, or equivalent Level 3 qualifications such as a BTEC or T-level. Level 7 degree apprenticeships also usually require a number of years of experience in a relevant role.

7 (Degree), considered equivalent to a master's

degree: A bachelor's degree or equivalent Level 4 or above qualifications, with a number of years of previous experience.

Financial support

Find additional financial support for travel, meals and accommodation costs, course equipment, and childcare from one of these schemes.

It's important to remember that you do not have to pay any course fees if you're staying on in education or training at a school, college, or with a training provider, and you're under the age of 19.

Tower Hamlets Educational Maintenance Allowance (EMA)

The Education Maintenance Allowance enables Tower Hamlets students in Sixth Form schools and colleges to apply for £400 to support them with their studies.

Eligibility for EMA

- You must be on a full time study programme at a recognised sixth form provision/college
- Your attendance on the full time study programme must be over 95%
- Your household annual income (excluding Housing benefit and Council tax reduction) needs to be below £25,000.
- You will need to have been a resident of Tower Hamlets for three years unless you are a refugee on the Ukraine or Afghan scheme.
- You must not receive EFSA or a Discretionary Bursary

Tower Hamlets and Canary Wharf Further Education Trust

The Trust is a joint initiative led by the council and Canary Wharf Group. Since it was established in 1990, it has supported more than 4,500 residents of the borough.

The trust's mission is to promote further and higher education as well as vocational training for Tower Hamlets residents with a particular focus on those in the greatest need of financial support to make the journey through education and into employment. It offers financial grants to help with education costs for students who have finished school and are not taking GCSEs or A-levels.

16-19 Bursary Fund

This can help with essential education-related costs like:

- clothing, books and other equipment for your course
- transport and lunch on days you study or train.

You may be able to get a bursary if at least one of the following applies:

- you're in or you recently left local authority care
- you get Income Support or Universal Credit because you're financially supporting yourself
- you get Disability Living Allowance (DLA) in your name and either Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) or Universal Credit
- you get Personal Independence Payment (PIP) in your name and either ESA or Universal Credit

Discretionary Bursaries

Each school or college also has its own criteria for discretionary bursaries – this usually takes account of your family income. You can ask school and college staff about the criteria they use to award discretionary bursaries before you apply for a place.

Benefits

Your parents and carers will still receive child benefit for you until you are 19 as long as you remain in approved full-time education or training. Usually, if you are under 18 you cannot claim any additional benefits. There are some exceptions, for example, if the young person has dependent children. [Contact your local Job Centre Plus](#) to find out more.

Financial support

Help with travel and accommodation costs

Travel costs

Transport for London (TfL) operates a scheme of discounted travel for 16 to 18 year olds who hold a 16+ Oyster photocard. This includes free travel on buses and discounted travel on the Tube, DLR, London Overground, the Elizabeth Line and most National Rail Services in London.

Accommodation costs

You might be able to get help with the cost of term-time accommodation if you're studying a further education course away from home. There are two schemes the [Residential Bursary Fund \(RBF\)](#) and [Residential Support Scheme \(RSS\)](#).

Care to Learn

You can get help with childcare costs while you're studying publicly funded courses in England if you're under 20 years old at the start of your course. (You can't get this funding if you're doing a paid apprenticeship or doing a higher education course, for example at university or college.)

Dance and Drama Award (DaDA)

Get help with fees and living costs at one of 15 private dance and drama schools. You must be studying one of the Level 5 or Level 6 Trinity College London Diplomas. You must also be aged 16 to 23 or over and show talent and likelihood to succeed in the industry.

Family Action's Educational Grants Programme

Family Action distributes grants to individuals over the age of 14, looking to unlock their educational potential by participating in further education. Family Action's Educational Grants Programme helps individuals to begin their studies as well as supporting existing students to continue and complete their studies.

Our Sixth Form strives to challenge and support students and maximise their achievement through academic challenge, pastoral support and careers guidance. Students achieve outstanding results and our excellent staff offer support individually tailored to each student through a wide range of two-year BTEC and A-level courses.

Each year we have a large number of applicants to Oxbridge and Russell Group Universities as well as a successful track record of students applying to medical programmes. Our experienced staff will regularly meet with you and your parents to ensure that you are on track and achieving your potential.

Students study at least three A-levels or a BTEC Course. We offer a wide range of subjects, with over 20 A-level courses and several Level 3 BTEC and CTEC courses. Our exciting curriculum, highly developed enrichment programme, and wealth of opportunities to develop broader skills including mentoring and leadership skills ensure excellent academic outcomes and personal development. Our students leave our Sixth Form and go on to further study or employment truly world and career ready.

At Bow we offer our Sixth Form students the opportunity to study individualised pathways, enabling every student to succeed and to meet differing needs. We offer two pathways, complemented by a wealth of expertise in teaching and a huge range of opportunities. Our Technical Pathway is focused on BTEC Level 3 qualifications in subjects such as Business, Applied Science and Sport, and our A-level Pathway allows students to study three or four subjects from a range of curriculum areas that is increasing every year. Our track record of success has seen over 90% of students who wish to do so going onto university or taking on further training through an apprenticeship or work-based placement. Well over a third of our students progress to Russell Group

universities, including Oxbridge, to study courses ranging from Medicine and Engineering to English Literature and International Relations.

For our students to achieve this level of success, we have a highly trained tutor and pastoral team who provide excellent support with progression, which is tailored to individual student interests. We are able to offer one-to-one support with UCAS, apprenticeship and job applications and we work with a range of external partners who deliver high quality workshops on employment, personal statement writing, student finance and interview skills. We also offer a bespoke programme of mentoring to our Oxbridge candidates which has translated into several successful applications over the course of





the last few years. This has been supported by our close links to Clare College, Cambridge and Oxford's Wadham and Jesus College. We have also recently joined the Elephant Group, an organisation which supports students to gain access to 'Top Third' universities.

Our Sixth Form pastoral team also offer a high level of well-being support. We have a dedicated Sixth Form Learning Mentor who works with our students on a one-to-one basis and we also have a dedicated counselling service for Sixth Form students provided by Step Forward. Our PSHE programme also provides students with opportunities to discuss their well-being, whilst also equipping them with the skills to be world-ready by broaching topics such as financial literacy, careers and mental health. Additional support is provided through our bespoke alumni mentor programme whereby our ex-students mentor our current students to ensure they receive personalised approachable support.

Our expectations for students are high, we expect them to aspire to be the best they can and to embody our school values, of determination,

adaptability, curiosity and respect, in their day to day studies and in their engagement in the wider life of the school. CFGFS6 is a large and vibrant all-girls sixth form with excellent educational outcomes. We offer a personalised curriculum, excellent pastoral support and an extensive extracurricular provision. We ensure that our students become competitive global citizens prepared for the next stage in their lives.

Students at CFGFS6 are offered many opportunities enabling them to excel both academically and socially. We have a wide range of courses from Level 2 to Level 3, with over 20 subjects offered at A-level. We also offer Level 3 BTEC courses, which can currently be taken as either a three A-level equivalent (Extended Diploma), or a one A-level equivalent (Certificate) combined with two A-levels.

Our quality of teaching is excellent, as is our high-quality tutoring and other provision we have on offer to our students, including a Key Stage 5 Academic Mentor who supports students and supervises our bespoke study area, Study6. Together, these ensure the achievements of our students. In 2022 80% of our students were offered places at university, a third of which were at Russell Group universities (e.g. Oxford, Cambridge, QMUL, LSE, UCL, Imperial and Warwick).

For high achieving students, we run two specialised programmes to support students in applying to competitive universities;

1. an internal programme 'The Reach Programme' that is aimed at the top GCSE achievers which supports students to achieve the highest grades and includes preparation for careers in Medicine, Dentistry Law and an Oxbridge entry programme
2. an external programme facilitated by The Elephant Access Project that is aimed at high achieving GCSE achievers which supports students in applying to competitive universities and offers students 3 pathways – Technology/ Healthcare and Oxbridge.

CFGFS6 is proud to have a number of additional partnerships supporting students in their academics and post-18 progression. We have partnerships with The Access Project, The Girls Network, The Catalyst Leadership Programme, Into University, Young Enterprise, BeReady Programme, KCL MedSoc, LSESU Law Programme and the London School of Architecture.

CFGFS6 is based in its own building – Aspire. Students can enjoy and benefit from excellent teaching



facilities including dedicated sixth form ICT suites, quiet working zones, a library, prayer room and their own dining areas in the Café6 and Social6 (Common Room) that opens out onto our rooftop terrace with panoramic views of London.

We have high expectations of our students, which over the past few years have translated into excellent academic outcomes for all of our students. Our pastoral team provide exceptional support and guidance, and students comment on the supportive ethos of the school. Our pastoral programme focuses on student well-being and equips students with skills they need for the future.

All our Year 12 students undertake work experience and are encouraged to source experiences to enhance their interest in their chosen pathway. Throughout the year, students can also work with personal Business Mentors as part of the Access project providing enrichment and opportunities to enhance a student's experiences of working in the wider world. These opportunities are shared with all students and additional support is provided to support applications.

Students and parents receive a weekly Student Opportunity Bulletin that informs students of programmes and events that can transform their education as well as their cultural capital. We believe that every student is a future leader and hence our students are offered different enrichment opportunities to help develop their leadership skills. Year 12 students have the opportunity to become Mental Health Ambassadors, Subject Ambassadors, Reading Buddies programme with Year 7 and local primary schools, leading on The Catalyst Programme and becoming

a Year 12 Junior Prefect. In addition to this, we also have an exclusive opportunity for students to apply for paid employment with the school to be a Junior Assistant for the Central+ programme for Key Stage 3-5 students.

CFG6 has successful links with universities such as KCL, LSE and QMUL and our students benefit from programmes and mentoring from these establishments. Our tutors are exceptional and the support provided to students through their UCAS and Apprenticeship applications is unparalleled.

They do this by providing them with the best opportunities, facilities and teaching to ensure they develop the skills, get the access and make the most of the opportunities when they come. ELAM believes all children growing up in the UK should see themselves in UK culture - it is proudly diverse, inclusive and creative.

ELAM offers a two-year UAL Level 3 Extended Diploma in Music, Film & TV production and Games Design (equivalent to three A-levels). All young people attending ELAM must study either English or Maths alongside their main course. The percentage of our young people achieving 'Distinctions' (the highest level grade possible) is more than double the national average.

Music – UAL Level 3 Extended Diploma in Music Performance & Production

Our core purpose is to ensure that every student will graduate with the best qualification and with the sense of purpose, self-confidence, self-belief and readiness to play a positive role within their local and global community.

The LPS guarantee is to provide support with personal development through our enrichment and tutor programme. Students receive independent careers advice from our in-house Enrichment and Careers Coordinator, and also benefit from the links that we have with a diverse range of partner both in the public sector and the private sector.

Approaches to induction

All students with a conditional offer are invited to attend an Induction event in July. This provides a taster for the subjects, which ensures that students make an informed choice. During the first week of September there is an induction led by subject teachers and tutors where students are supported with transition from KS4 to KS5, as well as the high expectations of LPS Sixth Form being reinforced.

Approaches to teaching and assessment

There are five formative assessments that take place over the two years. In Year 12 there are two initial classroom-based assessments. This allows for early support and intervention where pupils are

underperforming. PPE1 (Pre-Public Exam) takes place in the summer term, where pupils are assessed under exam conditions. PPE2 takes place in the autumn term of Year 13, which is a key basis for predicting UCAS grades. PPE3 takes place in spring term of Year 13, which is a final opportunity for exam practice and helps identify areas where further intervention is required.

Approaches to promoting students' wider personal development

The school day starts with a 20 minute tutorial programme, which is fully planned, as well as a weekly assembly. This is part of personal development and the delivery is monitored. There is also a weekly enrichment programme, which includes a variety of opportunities for pupils. This has included a programme delivered by NCS, as well as workshops from companies such as Deloitte and Credit Suisse. Our students are part of Realising Opportunities and K+ and attend events with universities as part of their programmes. Our students have been involved with opportunities such as the Investec programme, Future



Leaders and Sutton Trust Pathways, to name but a few. They have also been on work placements through the EY Foundation and Uptree. Our links are vast, and the use of Google Classroom makes it easy to inform students of the opportunities available to them.

Support for transition beyond post-16

LPS has a full time Careers and Enrichment Coordinator, who supports all students with career choices and transition. Students are supported with the UCAS process, and with early applications for subjects such as medicine and for Oxbridge applicants. LPS students have secured places at Oxbridge and other Russell Group universities. Students are given advice on apprenticeships and attend events as part of National Apprenticeship Week. Students' engagement is tracked and tutors play an active role in supporting students who require support and guidance. Student leadership is developed through student-voice roles, work placement opportunities as well as opportunities to take leadership roles on school-based initiatives.

Pastoral support

All students are part of a form group and are expected to attend school on time, every day. Pastoral Support is offered by the tutors as a first point of contact, as well as the Sixth Form Leadership. There is a Well-Being Group on Google Classroom, where students can raise any concerns. There is an excellent support system for students, with access to an Inclusion Team, including Counselling support and school based Social Worker.

Support for students with SEND

There is a strong SEND team, with a whole unit dedicated to whole school SEND support. There is a KS5 Foundation Course on offer for students with an EHCP. All other SEND student needs are identified, strategies devised and progress is monitored.

We are a large, vibrant Sixth Form and see the diversity of our student body as a real strength. We are proud to offer a wide range of academic courses and extracurricular opportunities, along with a comprehensive programme of pastoral support.

Morpeth Sixth Form is an exciting and vibrant place to study; we have close to 400 students across Years 12 and 13 and are proud of our diverse and energetic student body. Morpeth Sixth Formers come from a range of schools, and we welcome students from all backgrounds with a wide range of interests.

Our A-level and BTEC offer enables students to embark on programmes of study which interest and inspire them, resulting in excellent outcomes at the end of Year 13. We currently offer 21 A-level courses, ranging from Art and Textiles to Maths and Music, along with three Level 3 BTECs.

Our teachers take pride in the quality of teaching, and are always seeking ways to improve practice. In all of our work, we aim to support students to reach the top grades. Our approach is to ensure students are actively engaged in their learning, either by taking part in class discussions or by embarking on independent research.

All subjects at our Sixth Form have a dedicated online platform, enabling students to access resources such

as past papers and revision material outside of school time. It is this engagement with academic progress, and a full and comprehensive support programme for UCAS, that has seen our Sixth Formers move on to some fantastic destinations at the end of Year 13. For example, in 2022 44% of all our students went to Russell Group, 1994 Group or Top 20 universities, including top institutions such as the University of Cambridge and Imperial College, London. Many of our students have also benefited from an enhanced programme of UCAS support to enable them to secure places on competitive courses. We are ambitious for our students, and this year aim to secure even more competitive places.

We have long supported students wishing to study outside of London, and provide practical and financial support to facilitate this. Alongside this, all students are offered careers interviews early in Year 12 to enable goals for life after Sixth Form to be set. Students aiming to secure top university places or study medicine are identified early in Year 12 and incorporated in to the Scholars' Programme which provides with a



range of opportunities and practical support. Additional academic support for all students is provided by way of our programme of alumni mentors (ex-students who support with academic progress in one-to-one or small group sessions) along with access to more specialised personal support if needed. To further support the progress of all students, we recognise the need to develop independent learning skills, and so offer Supervised Study to all Year 12s who join us, which provides the opportunity to complete private work during the school day.

Of course, we recognise that a successful Sixth Form experience is comprised of both pastoral support and access to a wide range of extracurricular opportunities. At Morpeth Sixth Form, students are assigned to form groups with a dedicated tutor who oversees progress and provides support with university applications under the leadership of a Head of Year. Students spend one session per fortnight with their tutor exploring important wider social and political issues, and we are always keen to respond to students' feedback about what should be covered.

We encourage all students to engage with our extracurricular offer; this ranges from the Duke of Edinburgh award, to a core volunteering programme, chess club and debating opportunities. There are social events planned in across the year, such as a Winter Ball and a formal graduation ceremony for Year 13. In addition to this, all students regularly benefit from talks by external speakers who encourage them to think critically about issues affecting our world today. Our active student

council plays a key role in shaping our extracurricular offer according to the interests of students.

Finally, Morpeth Sixth Formers benefit from their own dedicated building, the Wessex Wing. This includes excellent facilities such as a student kitchen (free breakfast and break time snacks are provided), a full library along with study, ICT and social spaces.

A-levels and BTEC Level 3 Extended Diplomas form our main offer. For students yet to reach grade 4 threshold there is excellent provision for L2 BTEC with English and Maths GCSE.

Whilst we encourage students to follow as broad and balanced curriculum as possible, we also recognise many will wish to specialise to prepare for their future. We offer numerous curriculum pathways from Sports and the Arts to Business, ICT and the Humanities. 1. The Academic Pathway - students take up three A-levels courses, and depending on prior attainment, the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ).
2. The Vocational or Combined Pathway - students take the Level 3 BTEC Diploma course (equivalent to three A-levels). There is also the opportunity to complete a combined qualification, where students can take BTEC courses (equivalent to two A-levels) with one A-level.
3. The Level 2 BTEC Diploma. All students who follow this pathway will study either Level 2 Business Studies or Health and Social Care, along with GCSE re-sit English Language and/or mathematics.

A-level classes are limited to a maximum of 20 students whilst BTEC classes are limited to a maximum of 25 students.

We have a rigorous seven-week online transition programme to ensure a smooth progression from Year 11 into our Sixth Form, with the aim of supporting students to develop the core skills required to succeed as a Sixth Form student, and to underpin the fundamentals of their chosen courses in Year 12.

Our SASS Futures Programme brings experts from various industries to present and speak to students about future career prospects. Specialist pathways include Preparing to Study at Oxbridge, Law, IT, Medicine and Dentistry.

We are committed to ensure all of our students are ready for the next stage of their lives, and we have a huge focus on the world of work and further education.



We have a dedicated Careers and University Hub for all Sixth Form students, with individualised and tailored support from our Careers Manager and UCAS Co-ordinator. This can include one-to-one careers interviews, mentoring sessions and placement schemes.

We engage with students and their parents to ensure that we work together and play an active role in the choices that students make for their first steps into their future.

In addition, our Personal Development Programme encourages students to develop the core skills needed to succeed outside of academia. This programme promotes leadership, team work, communication and the well-being of our students, both physically and mentally.

In lessons we develop higher order skills by focusing on AAE (application of knowledge, analysis and evaluation). This encourages students to become analytical independent learners, and we support this by providing every student with their own laptop for use during their

time at Stepney All Saints. Subject Teachers, Form Tutors and Heads of Year work closely to ensure that all students are making positive academic progress, are engaged with enrichment activities and have an excellent record of attendance and punctuality.

Support and early intervention is put in place where needed to ensure that students continue to make good progress. This comprehensive approach has led to Stepney

All Saints maintaining its Ofsted Outstanding status in its most recent inspection in 2021.

All our students leave Stepney All Saints with a clear pathway. 93% of our students applied to university in 2021, including top Russell Group Universities such as Cambridge, LSE UCL, Imperial and Queen Mary's or enrolled on elite apprenticeship programmes with lead firms in the City of London and UK Civil Service.

LEAP Sixth Form College is an alternative provision college for students who prefer smaller classes, closer working relationships with supportive teachers and support staff, as well as more intensive pastoral and therapeutic support.

LEAP Sixth Form College provides a stimulating, vibrant, friendly and supportive setting in which students can continue their academic education beyond Year 11.

LEAP offers a wide range of academic and vocational provisions, which we also compliment with a varied and interesting range of work experience and apprenticeship opportunities.

We offer a combination of excellent teaching, professional advice and first-class pastoral care to ensure that students have every opportunity to develop their potential to the full.

Our intensive careers programme ensures that our students are well equipped for life after LEAP.

In LEAP Sixth Form you will need to re-sit your English and Maths GCSEs, study one option subject and attend one work experience opportunity.

Maths GCSE, Functional Skills and Edexcel Awards in Mathematics

The Year 12 resit GCSE maths course is a one-year course that will build on your current maths knowledge at

GCSE to support you in achieving a grade 4 or higher.

You will be studying a compact one-year scheme of work at foundation tier that will lead you to a retake of the GCSE in either November 2023 (if you are likely to pass earlier) or June 2024.

We will be encouraging you to sit the functional Skills Exam at either Level 1 or level 2 until you pass. Students will also sit Edexcel Awards in Mathematics Level 1 and Level 2.

In order to maximise your chances of success, your Maths teacher will be supporting you throughout, using a range of resources and will be expecting you to complete weekly Mathswatch assignments.

English GCSE and Functional Skills

The GCSE English resit course is a one-year course that will build on the English course studied in year 11.

Students will be offered the opportunity to retake English Language GCSE in November 2023, and Summer 2024. You will also be





entered for Functional Skills Level 1 and level 2 to ensure you have as many qualifications as possible.

For those who pass GCSE English Language before in Summer 2023, we may be able to offer English Literature GCSE.

Preparing for adulthood in Tower Hamlets

Supporting young people who have special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND)

Most young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities will need support to make sure they can move smoothly into adulthood. This move is called transition. We want to make sure that you have the same life chances as your friends in mainstream settings, so we have put together information to help you think about what route might be best for you when you leave school after Year 11.

We know it may be difficult to make big decisions and choices, even when you have lots of information. So, if you have any concerns or questions, please speak to your SENCO, SEN Caseworker, school careers advisor or your social worker.

When you leave school at 16, we want to make sure that you have choice, control and freedom over your life. We want you to be independent, to have friends, to be healthy and to be involved in your local community. You can be helped to do this by people like your social worker and SENCO but there are also many courses that can help you develop life skills and give you qualifications and experience that can help you get to university or into employment.

You can choose to attend any of the mainstream sixth forms or college listed within this booklet. The information below explains other options you have. You can use it to see what else is out there for you and to think about the steps you will take after you leave school.

Study Programmes for young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities

These programmes give you an opportunity to work towards a qualification, get some work experience and improve your English and maths. If you are not ready for a qualification you can still do a study programme. You will get some work experience and take part in lots of non-qualification activities.

Pre-Supported Internship and Pre-Apprenticeship programmes

These programmes are for young people over the age of 16 who want to work but are not ready for an Apprenticeship or Supported Internship.

You will have an opportunity to get work experience and improve your employability skills. These programmes will also help you to build your confidence and become more independent. You will be able to improve your maths and English.

Supported Internships

These programmes usually last for one year and are for 16-24-year-olds who have an EHCP. Supported Internships focus on getting a job so there is a lot of learning in the workplace.

Some Supported Internships allow you to move around so that you get to try different work areas and decide which one you like most. This helps you decide what you are best at and where you would like to work in future.

You will be expected to attend for four or five days a week but do not worry, you will receive support from a job coach and a tutor. You will also get help to continue with your English and maths.

You do not need any qualifications to get onto a Supported Internship.

Traineeships

Traineeships help 16-24-year-olds who have an EHCP get ready for an apprenticeship or job if they don't have the appropriate skills or experience. A traineeship is a course with work experience that gets you ready for work or an apprenticeship. It can last from six weeks up to one year, though most traineeships last for less than six months.

From 1st August 2023, the government will stop funding traineeships, but some providers will continue to offer traineeships as part of a study programme.

You can speak to a careers advisor at Young WorkPath if you want to know more about Traineeships.

Apprenticeships for young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities

Apprenticeships are available at levels 2, 3 and 4. However, if you have an EHCP and have the ability to get an entry 3 or above in English and maths, you may be considered for an Apprenticeship. The main entry criteria is the desire to work. Apprenticeships usually last for a year but could go up to 18 months for young people with an EHCP.

Many young people remain working with the same employer at the end of the apprenticeship. Others go on to get a job elsewhere.

University

Your EHCP ends once you start university, but your social worker will talk to you about the support that you can get when you start university. If you do not have a social worker, please discuss any concerns with your SEND caseworker.

Beatrice Tate School is a secondary special school in Tower Hamlets with a Sixth Form provision for learners aged 11 to 19 with severe learning difficulties (SLD) and profound and multiple learning difficulties (PMLD).

Beatrice Tate is a secondary school and Sixth Form where individuals are valued and all staff and students are expected to give their best. We respect and value all our learners and are committed to providing a caring, friendly and safe environment for all our students so they can learn and achieve in a supportive and secure atmosphere.

Beatrice Tate School is a purpose-built school and Sixth Form for students whose educational needs cannot adequately be met in mainstream schools or Sixth Forms. The school was built in 2013 and provides a high quality learning environment for our learners, all of whom have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

At Beatrice Tate School we aim to:

- provide opportunities for all students to learn and to achieve;
- promote our students' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development;
- prepare our learners for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of life.

Our innovative, learner-focused curriculum which delivers a range of engaging, challenging and achievable learning experiences, is the means by which we meet these aims.

In order to provide Sixth Form learners with experiences that are relevant, interesting and challenging and to identify opportunities for progression, we offer a Sixth Form curriculum structure with three broad pathways: pre-formal, semi-formal and formal. These pathways are not defined by age but by need and achievement; students may therefore move from one pathway to the next at any point in their Sixth Form course. Each pathway covers skills, knowledge and understanding across a range of subject areas, including Communication and Understanding; Science and Technology, Personal and Physical Development and Creative and Performing Arts.

All students attending Beatrice Tate School Sixth Form will have an EHCP which will set out the required



provision for individual students. EHCPs are reviewed annually.

The EHCP looks at all the individual's needs and brings together education, health and care services to achieve agreed outcomes. The focus is very much on what is important for learners – what they want to achieve now and in the future. The plans put young people and families at the centre of the assessment and planning process. This person-centred planning process enables learners to have choice and control.

Students attending Beatrice Tate School Sixth Form are taught in small teaching groups; staffed according to the learners' ability to work independently. The need for additional support such as physiotherapy, occupational therapy, and speech and language therapy is agreed in the Education, Health and Care Plan.

Bowden House School



Bowden House School in Seaford, East Sussex is a specialist, weekly residential school committed to supporting students between the ages of 9 to 16+ who present with a range of complex social, emotional and mental health difficulties.

Upon finishing their secondary education, some students choose to remain living at Bowden House School and apply to colleges in the local area. They are supported towards independent living by our Post-16 staff team.

Students are encouraged to help and prepare food at meal times, keep bedrooms clean and tidy, wash and iron clothes, and set a good example of behaviour to the younger students below them in school.

All students attend college in Brighton or Eastbourne and there are various course options for the students to choose from covering a wide variety of subjects from car repairs, bricklaying, woodwork, music, cooking, building and Sports Science.

Post-16 is the senior house of the school and can help the students prepare for life outside of Bowden House.





Students are able to join in with onsite activities and will often go out as a group, evening activities range from Ten Pin Bowling, Gym sessions, banger racing, football matches, rugby matches, also day trips to Arundel Castle, Portsmouth Dockyard and Longleat.

All Post-16 students use public transport to and from the school to college, students also travel home to London at weekends by train. Students are taught how to read timetables, buy tickets and independently travel.

Post-16 students are helped with money skills, understanding the world in which we live, helping and respecting others less fortunate than themselves.

Post-16 is a real home from home for the students, staff and students have a great relationship with each other, making Post-16 a great place to live and work.

Phoenix offers a range of sensory and therapeutic interventions and a multidisciplinary approach to meeting the needs of our students. We encourage a holistic integrated approach and have a multidisciplinary team to enable a strong partnership with other agencies, parents and families.

Phoenix Sixth Form Department has developed a vocational curriculum so that all students have the opportunity to enhance their skills and knowledge for the wider world. It aims to develop the skills needed to prepare the young person for the next steps of their personal journey and preparation for adulthood.





Curriculum

The sixth form curriculum is broad and comprehensive as it aims to enrich students' lives as they transition towards adulthood.

Students have the opportunity to build on from prior learning and further develop functional skills across all curriculum areas. All sixth form classes are split into learning pathways entry to the provision, learning for each of the student and the basis of their learning pathway is developed from the outcomes identified in their EHCP, Vocational Profile and progress reviews.

Their personalised programme is then further developed according to their strengths, interests and aspirations. Students may move from one pathway to the next at any point in their Sixth Form course.

Tower Project JET Service

Employment First is a supported internship programme delivered by Tower Project JET Service. It helps young people with learning disabilities and/or those on the autistic spectrum (with an EHCP) between the ages 18-25 progress into work in East London's thriving hospitality and leisure sector.

At the core of the Employment First Programme is an extended work placement across the academic year at a host employer. Host employers include the five-star Town Hall Hotel, the award-winning Genesis Cinema, the prestigious Rich Mix Arts Centre and JET's successful catering social enterprises Ocean View and Haggerston Perk.

While on placement, interns will gain the skills to undertake a range of job roles and will receive both in-work and class-based vocational training. The training is led by JET's Employment Skills Tutors and industry experts from JET's employer partners including Compass Group and Shangri La Hotels.

Interns also receive in-work support from JET's specialist TSI-trained Job Coaches. All interns on the programme will be allocated a JET Disability Employment Adviser who, as qualified supported employment practitioner, will support interns to progress into employment at the end of the programme.

Having successfully delivered supported internship programmes in the London Boroughs of Tower Hamlets for almost a decade,

JET achieves consistently high progression rates into employment for its interns, with companies including Intercontinental Hotel Group, BBC Studio Events, Levy Restaurants, Cineworld, AEG, Restaurant Associates, Petersham Nurseries and HSBC Bank.

DFN Project SEARCH



Project SEARCH is a supported internship programme for young people with learning disabilities and/or those on the autistic spectrum (with an EHCP) between the ages 17-25. It is a unique, business led, one-year education-to-work programme that takes place entirely in the workplace.

Tower Hamlets has two Project SEARCH sites, one fully established site at Queen Mary University of London (QMUL) and another with ISS (Liverpool Street). It is a partnership between a host business (QMUL and ISS), education establishments (Phoenix School and College), supported employment services (Kaleidoscope Sabre Associates) and the local authority. The programme offers total workplace immersion, facilitating a seamless combination of employability skills, career exploration and hands-on training through a series of job rotations within the host business.

The programme runs from 9am to 3.30pm five days a week, for a full academic year. Typically, interns complete three work placements between 10-12 weeks in length with each rotation coinciding with school terms. Interns also study an Employability Course to supplement their work experience.

The work rotations on offer include: Admin, IT, Domestic, Catering, Retail, Security and many more.

Since Project SEARCH QMUL began in 2019, 85% of interns who joined the programme secured full-time paid employment. Our excellent follow-on support has helped ensure that all of the interns have remained in employment.

Businesses who have employed our interns include Greggs, Home Bargains, McDonalds, Phoenix School, Énergie Fitness, G4S & Leon Restaurant.

The supported Internship programme is a fixed one-year exit course offered by New City College, Tower Hamlets Campus. It is designed to support people aged between 18-24 with special educational needs and/or disabilities into paid employment.

The programme is hands-on and takes place mainly in the workplace. Work placements are usually for up to 3 days a week from 10am to 4pm during term time, though this depends on the capabilities of the young person as well as the needs of the partnering work placement provider. Work placements typically last for 10 to 12 weeks.

Interns also take English and Maths classes on Mondays and Tuesdays from 9:30am to 4:15pm.

The programme follows the Education and Training Foundation's [Recognising and Recording Progress and Achievement \(RARPA\)](#) process.

Support from a Job Coach

Interns also receive intensive support from a job coach to help them make the most of their work placements and to support successful transition into the employment.
